Being a Reflection of God's Light

The 17th-century Dutch artist Jan Vermeer incorporated what some art historians have termed *holy light* into many of his paintings. This aspect of his painting style introduced sunlight from the outside world, as a separate character, into the interior world of his painting subjects who were going about their daily lives as they tended the mundane tasks of everyday life.

One of Vermeer's best-known paintings, Young Woman with a Water Jug ca. 1662, which depicts a young woman beginning her daily tasks in the light of a half-opened window, is a prime example of this characteristic of his work. At first glance, the viewer might assume that the woman, who is peacefully wrapped in her thoughts, as well as the objects of her domestic material world, including her white headdress that adorns her and copper jug and ewer sitting on the table next to her, are the objects of focus in this painting. Yet, these objects and all else the morning light illuminates as it softly bathes the room are merely the pretext. The purpose of each object on which light falls is to celebrate the presence and gift of the light and its revealing and transforming nature, which has entered this young woman's world. The nature of these objects is secondary to the gift of light and its nature. This week's Gospel (John 3:14-21) calls our attention to the gift of light, the Son of God, sent into the world to save the world from itself and not to condemn it. The Son is the light whose purpose is not to shame us by pointing out the sinful deeds of individuals but rather to shed light on the sinful behaviors of a world that loves darkness and often embraces the injustice, hate, and lack of mercy that it hides in the shadows in the hope of not being discovered.

The season of Lent invites us, softly bathed in the gracious, holy light of God's love, to consider how we might be a reflection and celebration of the presence of the light of the Son that has been sent into the world to offer redemption and the gifts of justice, compassion, love, and equality through our light-giving activity. Let us faithfully finds ways to be the light that God shines on us in a world where darkness is far too prevalent. Living in and by God's gracious light,

In our international work we partner closely with companion churches and other Lutheran and ecumenical relief agencies to make sure local needs are being addressed and met. In the United States, we work through our extensive affiliate network and other partners to address these same concerns.

Lutheran Disaster Response strives to help the church continue to be church in the midst of disaster — following Christ's call to share hope and healing with our neighbor in need. Some key areas of work include:

"In his *Preface to Romans* Martin Luther writes, 'this epistle is really the chief part of the New Testament, and is truly the purest gospel...It is a bright light, almost sufficient to illuminate the entire Holy Scriptures'" (*Martin Luther's Basic Theological Writings*, second ed., Fortress, 2005 pp. 98-99). *Romans* is also the most challenging of the Pauline epistles and will likely provide those participating with significant, in-depth discussion and new ideas to chew on as we wade through it and learn and grow together in our faith lives and our relationships with God and our Lord.
