Congregational Gatherings in April

There will be two important gatherings in April to discuss the future of Holy Trinity.

Sunday, April 14, there will be a forum following the morning worship service. The Congregation Council plans to present several options (with details and implications for each) for discussion. The discussion will help the Council reduce the options for a final congregational vote.

Sunday, April 28, will be the annual Spring Congregational Meeting following the morning worship service. As part of the meeting, the Congregation Council plans to conduct a vote to set definitively the direction for the congregation.

The Council hopes to have both meetings in the Sanctuary, so that they can be livestreamed. While the meetings will be available for viewing while they occur, there will not be a way for viewers to participate. Also, the livestream will probably **not** be available for later viewing.

How We Work

We are a church that is a catalyst, convener and bridge builder. Lutheran Disaster Response collaborates with other disaster response organizations and religious entities in the United States and around the world. This enables the greatest stewardship of resources and maximum impact of response. We are a welcome partner because we respect the perspectives and strengths of others. We recognize that every disaster is local. Because of this, we believe every response needs to be rooted in the community; we work to accompany that community from immediate relief through long-term recovery. In our international work we partner closely with companion churches and other Lutheran and ecumenical relief agencies to make sure local needs are being addressed and met. In the United States, we work through our extensive affiliate network and other partners to address these same concerns.

Lutheran Disaster Response strives to help the church continue to be church in the midst of disaster — following Christ's call to share hope and healing with our neighbor in need. Some key areas of work include:

- Providing emotional and spiritual care for people who have been affected by a disaster and for leaders who respond to a disaster
- Coordinating volunteers through our local affiliates
- Assisting refugees in a holistic way by meeting the varied needs of the community
- Promoting disaster risk-reduction by helping communities build their assets thereby reducing the effects of likely disasters
- Providing long-term recovery efforts by addressing the unmet needs months or even years after a disaster strikes

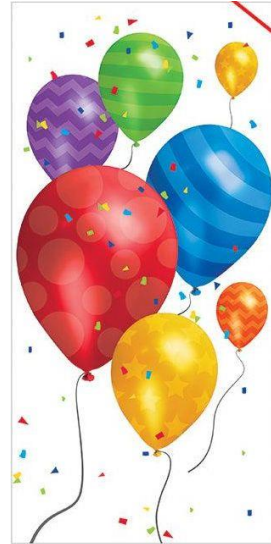

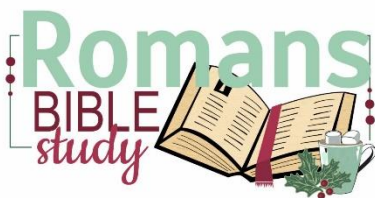
Three Score and Ten Banquet-

New Bible Exploration

For those participating in the Bible study of Romans, remember there will not be class on Tuesday, March 26 (Holy Week) or Tuesday, April 2. We will resume the study on Tuesday, April 9 at 11:00 AM.

Continuing on Tuesdays you are invited to join in a study of the book of *Romans*. The study will take place each Tuesday morning from 11:00 AM to roughly 12:00 PM. "In his *Preface to Romans* Martin Luther writes, 'this epistle is really the chief part of the New Testament, and is truly the

purest gospel...It is a bright light, almost sufficient to illuminate the entire Holy Scriptures”
(*Martin Luther’s Basic Theological Writings*, second ed., Fortress, 2005 pp. 98-99). *Romans* is also the most challenging of the Pauline epistles and will likely provide those participating with significant, in-depth discussion and new ideas to chew on as we wade through it and learn and grow together in our faith lives and our relationships with God and our Lord. There will be sign-up sheet in the Gathering Area for those who are interested in participating.
